
What is Collaboration?

Collaboration is defined as **the identification**, **release**, **and union of the gifts of all baptized persons**. The belief that every baptized person is gifted and called to ministry is the basis for collaboration. The concept that **"the gifts we possess are gifts that God gives us"** is central to the understanding and implementation of collaborative ministry.



God gives us our talents not to put our names in lights, but to bring light into the lives of others.

11 And he gave some as apostles, others as prophets, others as evangelists, others as pastors and teachers, ¹² to equip the holy ones for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ,

Co-existence

- Individuals or groups identify with one another in some general way.
- They share some common history, mission, or membership.
- The individuals or groups exists separately and independently of each other.
- The only point of connection is their common designation as staff, team, or faculty.

Communication

- There is an explicit decision to enter into some mutual interaction and dialogue.
- Sharing of Information, such as calendars, programs, and activities.
- Lead to discussing matters of common and mutual interest.
- This initial sharing of Information, leads to a deeper level, the sharing of ideas and values.

Cooperation

- Awareness that that individuals and programs do not exist in isolation, but have impact on each other, either positively or negatively.
- This Dynamic is a movement towards interdependence.



True Collaboration

- The group acknowledges, articulates, and experience ownership of a common mission.
- There is a desire to work together for a common goal.
- "Turf" issues are relegated to a lower status.
- There is a decision to identify, value, and unite the various gifts that each possesses.




Small Groups

- 3. To what extent do we model collaborative relationships ourselves?














Intercultural Competence

Preferred Communication Styles



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


Low and High Context Communication

Importance of Collaboration
